1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 INTRODUCTION

G.T.N. Arts College is an aided and self-supporting, co- educational, Telugu linguistic minority institution affiliated to Madurai Kamaraj University, Madurai, Tamilnadu. The college is located in a rural area on Dindigul-old Karur main road, Dindigul District, Tamilnadu-624005.

G.T.Narayanaswamy Naidu Charities Trust was formed in August 1963. Dr.K.Rethinam, the secretary upholds the values of the trust now. The College is striding towards its 60th anniversary. The foundation stone of the College was laid in 1964 by Honorable M.Bakthavatsalam, the then Chief Minister. In 1965, the college grew in stature into a first grade institution by securing affiliation from the University of Madras in B.A. Br.I.History, Br.XII English Literature and B.Sc. Br.I Mathematics. In April 1965, after the formation of the Madurai Kamaraj University the college was affiliated to it for all programmes. In June 1971-72 Mathematics, Physics and Chemistry were started.B.Com. Programme was started in the academic year 1974 - 75.

M.Com programme was introduced in the academic year 1985-86 and B.Sc. Zoology Programme in the academic year 1986-87.

Self finance stream was successfully launched in the year 2000 with B.Com and B.Com (CA) Programmes. M.Sc. Chemistry was started in 2002. B.C.A. in 2003, B.Sc. (CS) and B.B.A. in 2005 were introduced. During 2006, B.Sc. IT and M.Sc. (CS & IT) were included. In 2010, M.A. English was begun. In 2012, B.A. English was started. In 2013, B.A. Tamil and M.Com.were included. In 2015, B.Sc. Chemistry, in 2016 M.A. Tamil, B.Sc. (Mathematics) and M.Sc. (Mathematics) were introduced. In 2017, Hotel Management and Catering Science and B.Sc. Physical Education were started. In 2018, M.Sc. (Physics) has been started. In 2019,B.S.W & M.S.W (Master of Social Work), B.Com (Banking & Insurance), B.B.A (Aviation Management), B.Sc. (Forensic Science)and B.Com(Professional Accounting)were started.

Research programmes leading to Ph.D. in Chemistry and Commerce have been started in 2003. In 2008-09, Choice Based Credit System was introduced. The Departments of Tamil and English have been upgraded as Research Centres from the year 2019. In 2020, Outcome Based Education was introduced in all the U.G and P.G. Programmes to fulfill the current needs of the stake holders.

Institutional Strength

- The college is situated in a lush green 37 acre, and Vidhya Vinayaka temple inside the campus envelops the atmosphere with its holy aura.
- The college receives its visitors through an imposing and elevated entrance, the tallest in South India, an architectural marvel indeed.
- No Plastics, No Smoking and No Tobacco vouch for clean and green campus.
- Battery operated vehicles in the campus provide conveyance for physically challenged and elderly people.
- Well-structured newly built admin block with all modern amenities, seminar rooms, ICT class rooms and English language lab enhances quality of education.
- An air-conditioned, multipurpose auditorium named after Dr. A. P. J. Abdulkalam functions as the venue for conducting meetings and seminars where eminent personalities address more than 3000 students at a time.
- Management reimburses tuition fee for the students who has secured more than 85% marks in the Summative Examination.
- Financial Grants are extended to the students from government, management, PTA and Alumni association.
- MOUs with other institutions and academic professional bodies like ICT academy and ELTAI give vast opportunities to attain the academic goals.
- Well formulated Teaching – learning and evaluation process with contemporary Student Induction Programme and effective Remedial classes result in good grounding for the students.
- Mentor-Mentee system creates a rapport between the teachers and the taught and thus promotes the

confidence of the students.

- Various Clubs and Associations in the college help to explore and develop the latent talents of the students.
- Internal Complaint Committee has been formed to ensure a conducive and safe environment for women.
- Women Cell takes care of the welfare of women students and teachers by addressing their issues.
- Anti Ragging cell ensures a safe and friendly academic atmosphere in the campus.
- Grievance and Redressal Cell is a window through which students' problems are redressed.
- NSS,NCC, YRC,RRC and other such extracurricular organizations prepare students to become morally and socially responsible citizens.
- The socially conscious students and staff of the college donate blood and have received Noble World Record Award.

Institutional Weakness

- Faculty with PhD qualification is less in number in Self-supporting programmes.
- Low progression rate of students to higher education due to poor family background.
- Research consultancy activities are confined.
- Few internationally acclaimed research papers and books are published by the faculty.
- Journals and books are less in number in the Research departments.
- UGC funded projects are a few in number.

Institutional Opportunity

- Incubation centre can be established to tune students to take up various jobs.
- Placement activities can be scaled up.
- All departments may be upgraded as research departments.
- New programmes like B.Sc. Geology, M.Sc. Embryology, Viscom, Biochemistry, Microbiology, Energy and Environmental Data Science, Artificial Intelligence etc. may be started.
- Admission of students from other states and countries can be accessed with proper links.

Institutional Challenge

- Lack of communication skill in English among the students is an impediment to impart education in advanced fields.
- Faculty and students exchange programmes are not feasible due to procedural and curricula issues.

1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

G.T.N has been exercising its academic autonomy since 2017 and hence has a greater role and responsibility of designing a relevant curriculum for assured graduation outcomes. The curricula are designed to meet the demands of industry and society, heeding the vision and mission of the Institution and following the guidelines of UGC - National Curriculum Framework and Tamil Nadu State Council for Higher Education (TANSCHÉ).

Nine new Programmes have been introduced during the assessment period, catering to the local, regional, national, and global needs. All UG and PG Programmes were revised in the year 2020. Outcome-Based Education was implemented in the curricula in 2020. The Programme Outcomes, Programme Specific Outcomes and Course Outcomes were defined for all Programmes. The Choice-Based Credit System for all UG and all PG Programmes is being continued in the curricula. All the courses are periodically updated with focus on employability, entrepreneurship and skill development among students. The curricula integrate cross-cutting issues of gender, environment, human values and professional ethics through the inclusion of 173 courses. Undergraduate research and internships for on-the-job experience are included in Part III and Extension activity is included in Part V of the curricula with credits. 60 value-added courses are offered for skill enhancement. Additional credits are awarded for soft skills self-study course. Feedback on the curricula is obtained from all stakeholders and analyzed for continuous improvement. Thus, the curricula designed thrive in calibration with the dynamic needs of the present era and skill enhancements of the students.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

The Institution was started with the dream of imparting education to rural students from poor circumstances and has raised the literacy rate of the first generation. The admission follows the policies given by the State Government and ensures transparency and equity. Student Induction programme (SIP) is conducted every year for the freshers. The department identifies slow learners and advanced learners based on their performance in the classroom and examination. Slow learners are assisted with remedial classes. Advanced learners are encouraged to involve themselves in peer teaching and participate in academic discourses. The college follows student-centric teaching pedagogies, viz., real time project, lab to land practice, peer teaching, internships, job trainings, field trips and industrial visits. Institution's Innovation Council identifies the best entrepreneurs and young minds with innovative ideas. The Teacher-Student ratio is 1:20. High teacher quality is maintained with 82 PhDs of which 26 are research guides and 25 teachers have qualified themselves with NET/SET examinations. The college employed online facilities for the smooth conduct of classes and examinations during the pandemic lockdown. Teachers are encouraged to develop e-content in their curriculum and nearly 200 e-contents have been made available for the students. Feedback mechanism for monitoring and evaluating teaching-learning process is in practice. The Controller of Examinations office is fully automated. The Academic Calendar includes schedules of CIA, ESE and annual action plan of the College. The transparency in the evaluation system is a healthy practice. The result is published on time.

Research, Innovations and Extension

The college promotes research culture among the teachers and the taught through the Research and Development (R&D) Cell and Research Advisory Committee (RAC) that guarantee research ethics and professionalism in all the research activities. Indexed journals and patents are filed through the Intellectual Property Right Cell. RAC strives to develop research facilities on campus and strengthens the research skills of the stake holders by organizing various programs and encourage publications in peer-reviewed indexed journals and UGC care listed journals. The R&D and IPR cells help students to conduct Science Expo, Conferences and Seminars. Research faculties are motivated to prepare proposals for various funding agencies like UGC, DBT, ICSSR, CSIR etc., A Minor Research Project for Rupees three lakhs is received from Mahatma Gandhi National Council of Rural Education [MGNCRE] in the year 2021-2022. Institution Innovation Council of the college has been declared as one of the Fifty Consortium Representatives for the State Level Consortium and it has been awarded 4 Star Ranking in the academic year 2021-2022. Research facilities in the college are enhanced through the intra-mural grants (G.T.N. AC Seed Money Scheme) and extramural research projects.

Sophisticated modern Instruments such as Bright Field Binocular Microscope, High-speed Refrigerated Centrifuge and UV-Visible Spectrophotometer etc., are accommodated in the laboratories of the three departments, Zoology, Physics and Chemistry. Twenty Six university-approved research guides facilitate Ph.D. programs in Four Research Centres and in the host University departments. Recently the Department of Mathematics also has been approved as a research centre by Madurai Kamaraj University.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

The College has adequate infrastructure that complements its vibrant academic environment. Special attention is given to infrastructural support and expansion to accommodate the increasing student strength in various and programmes. The College has 72 spacious classrooms with proper ventilation and necessary facilities. Among them 46 classrooms are provided with ICT facilities that enable the faculty members to adopt advanced technologies in teaching. Students are also trained to make Multimedia presentations. This ideal Digital environment facilitates the conduct of several zoom meetings and webinars. Besides, the college has 2 Seminar Halls, Laboratories, Language Lab, well stocked Library, Administrative Block, Principal office, Visitors room, Auditorium, Faculty rooms, Media Centre, IQAC office, Office of the Controller of examinations, Placement cell, Counseling room, NSS room, NCC room, Stationary Store, Innovation Centre, Health Care Centre, Physical Education department with separate hostels for Girls and Boys. The total campus is under 24/7 CCTV surveillance. The college provides excellent Wi-Fi connectivity with a speed of 500mpbs. Library which is centrally located on the campus could accommodate more than 350 students at a time and student community, Faculty members, and Research Scholars have easy access to it.. It is partially equipped with computer systems with high-speed internet facility. 45,115 books, 09 journals, 31 Magazines and INFLIBNET - N List e-Resources are at the disposal of the Faculties and Students. The college ground is very spacious and well maintained for both track and field events. The College has ample facilities for various Indoor and Outdoor Games. Many District, State, National Sports events are often conducted.

Student Support and Progression

As Student Support and Progression plays a vital role to the growth of the institution, G.T.N. pays great importance to it. In order to provide a holistic development to students, financial support through Government Scholarships and Management Freeships are given. Various clubs and committees like Fine Arts club, Fitness Club, Career Guidance cell, Placement Cell, Student Affairs Committee, Mentor-Mentee Committee, Grievance and Redressal Cell and Anti Ragging Committee enhance the campus life and career prospects of the students. Computer Literacy and Cyber Security Cell address the modern issues and development. Skill Development Centre fine tunes the attitudes and the skill set of the students. Co-Curricular and extra-Curricular activities expand the academic growth and orient the students to life skills. Value Added Courses are conducted to enable the students in interdisciplinary domains. Sports students are provided free hostel, free sports utilities and tuition fee waiver option too. Under Corporate Social Responsibility Scheme, Redington Foundation, Chennai, Tamilnadu, offered Soft Skill training to enhance employability prospects. Further, they extended Rs. 1,69,000/- as scholarship to the students. The financial support of the management enabled the sports students to bring many laurels like Gold Medal in South Asian Games in Boxing, All India Inter-University Bronze medal in Boxing and Silver medal in Power Lifting in the All India Inter-University Tournaments. Many G.T.Nites have become University Blues adding prestige to the institution. Many illustrious alumni adorn various coveted positions in the academic and administrative arenas and contribute to the progress of the nation.

Governance, Leadership and Management

The college is governed by the Chairman, members of the trust and the Principal, who is supported by the College Council consisting of the IQAC, the Controller of Examinations, Deans, Heads of the Departments, faculty members and non-teaching staff. The Board of trustees and the Principal of the college take wise decisions based on consultations with all the stake holders to make the college into a front-line educational institution in order to fulfill its envisaged vision. The Board of trustees meets twice a year to discuss matters concerning academics and administration enabling the college to function effectively. Numerous welfare measures for teaching and non-teaching personnel have been practiced. Financial incentives to the teaching staff are given for publication of research papers and presentation of papers in International, National, Regional and Local conferences. Group Insurance Scheme, EPF and ESI take care of the financial security of the employees working in Self Supporting Programmes. The children of the staff admitted in this college enjoy 50 percent fee concession. Outstanding and praiseworthy faculties are rewarded during the Teachers' Day and Women's Day celebrations regularly organized every year. More than 400 faculty members have received reimbursement for attending the Conferences, Seminars, Faculty Development Programmes, Refresher Courses, Orientation Programmes, and Workshops during the assessment period. On-duty leave is granted to attend seminars, conferences, valuations and examiner ship for attending the Board of Studies in other institutions. The College, as enunciated by UGC, moulds students as socially conscious citizens involving them in community service.

Institutional Values and Best Practices

G.T.N. College offers a congenial environment for students hailing from various socio-cultural backgrounds. The college strives to sensitize students on gender equity through the Women's Cell and Grievance Redressal and Counselling Cell that constantly collaborate to raise gender consciousness. With regard to environmental protection, the college has a spotlessly clean, plastic-free, green campus. The solar power system installed in the college takes care of the electrical requirements. Institutional environment and energy initiatives are assessed through green, energy and environment audit. Divyanjans have access to amenities such as battery powered vehicles, ramps, wheelchairs, scribes, human and software assistance. The college reveres the rich legacy and tradition of the country by celebrating festivals like Ugadi, Pongal, Diwali, Holi, Ganesh Chaturthi, Saraswathi Pooja, Ramzan and Christmas. Institutional preparedness for NEP

1. Multidisciplinary/interdisciplinary:	Higher Education in India is poised for a transformational change. The institution offers Choice Based Credit System (CBCS) from 2017-2018 and introduced the Outcome Based Education (OBE) from the academic year 2020-2021. In order to promote interdisciplinary concept the Non-Major Electives (NME) Courses are introduced and students prefer course of their choice and acquire knowledge other than their own domain. The college signed MOUs with reputed institutions and industries.
2. Academic bank of credits (ABC):	ABC helps the students to carry their certificates and the credits they earned digitally wherever they move. This gives students greater flexibility in pursuing their academic goals through technology-enabled virtual mobility. College registered in the National Academic Depository (NAD) as a prerequisite for ABC credits. The registration ID is NAD025077. A workshop was arranged for the Heads of the

	departments to orient the students to enroll their details in the NAD portal. This will facilitate the Controller of Examinations to publish the Certificates digitally.
3. Skill development:	In order to bridge the gap between theoretical knowledge and practical application Internships and Projects are introduced almost in all departments. In addition to this Skill Development Centre is functioning in the institution to carry out skill-oriented Courses. Value Added Courses are introduced in all departments to orient students towards entrepreneurship development. Using Ministry of Educational's Institution Innovation Council (IIC) many skill-oriented activities are carried out in the campus. Students of Computer Science participated in the India Hackathon 2022, in New Delhi.
4. Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using online course):	Courses focusing Human Values, Ethics and Environment Sustainability are introduced in all Programmes. Seminars are conducted on Commemoration days of National Leaders, and National Important Days are Celebrated so as to integrate the Indian Knowledge System among the students. Pongal Celebrations, Republic Day and Independent Day Celebrations make students aware about the Cultural and Patriotic knowledge system of India
5. Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):	Imparting Higher Order Thinking (HOT) Skills in the Undergraduate level is envisioned in the NEP 2020. To enhance HOT Skill the focus of teaching shifted from mere Course Objective to Course Learning outcomes. Hence, the institution adopted the Outcome Based Education (OBE) from the Academic year 2020-2021. The entire Curriculum in all courses in both UG and PG Programmes were updated and about 176 new Courses were introduced during the assessment period. The faculty members were properly trained by inviting competent Resource Persons in defining the POs, PSOs and COs, thus creating student centric teaching-learning outcomes.

1.1 Curriculum Design and Development

1.1.1 Curricula developed and implemented have relevance to the local, national, regional and global developmental needs which is reflected in Programme outcomes (POs), Programme Specific Outcomes(PSOs) and Course Outcomes(COs) of the Programmes offered by the Institution.

Response:

The College offers 24 Undergraduate, 08 Postgraduate, and 04 Ph.D. programs for which the curricula are designed to cater to local, national, regional, and global developmental needs. The Institution follows an academically flexible Choice Based Credit System (CBCS) since 2008. The Board of Studies (BoS) has revamped the curricula to suit the Global requirements. The Governing Body and Academic Council approve the curricula.

The curricula enable the students to learn by themselves and work both independently and interdependently. Globalization, changing demographics, and technological advancements are some of the key driving forces of the future. Accordingly, the Institution has been taking efforts to design its academic curricula to meet the demands of society and industry by providing a learner-centric curriculum. Appropriately, the Institution has implemented UGC's Outcome Based Curriculum Framework (OBE) from 2020-2021 onwards.

Implementation of Outcome-Based Education (OBE) in the Curricula:

The initial phase for ensuring academic quality is designing the curricula, fixing the type of courses, the number of electives, and the curricular structure, with complete details of the course title and course contents as per the regulations of the UGC and TANSICHE.

In the next phase, the Course Outcomes (COs) for the course are mapped with the Program Outcomes (POs) and the Program Specific Outcomes (PSOs) of the program. Effective implementation of Outcome Based Education (OBE) ensures that our students have all the 12 POs (Program Outcomes) that equips them to compete at national as well as global platform. The program has 5 Specific Programme Specific Outcomes (PSOs). All departments keenly observe the attainments of POs and PSOs for their respective programs which in turn relate to the Vision and Mission of the Institution and Departments as well.

The initial version of the curricula is prepared by having the above design criteria, through discussions with stakeholders. The proposed curricula are then discussed in the Curriculum Development Cell and is forwarded to BOS (Board of Studies) which comprises faculty, student alumni, industrialist, and external subject experts. It is then placed for approval in the Academic Council (AC) of the College. Thus, the curriculum, after being approved by the above-mentioned statutory bodies, is implemented in the department.

The up-gradation of knowledge of the students in diversified fields through field visits, internships, and Industrial exposure is made mandatory. In addition to the curriculum, various value-added courses enhance students' skills and upgrade them as industry-ready young professionals.

All the courses in any program of study offered by G.T.N Arts College have relevance to local, national, and global developmental needs. The Institution contributes substantially to the research domains and concentrates on enhancing rural life.

2.2 Catering to Student Diversity

2.2.1 The institution assesses the learning levels of the students and organises special Programmes for advanced learners and slow learners

Response:

G.T.N. Arts College organizes Student Induction Programme after the college reopens for the First Year Students. The facilities in the college and the scope of the subjects being learnt are introduced in these sessions. The learning levels of the students are assessed at the end of the Student Induction Programme. Yoga training is also provided during the Induction programme.

The college assesses the learning levels of the students in a way at the time of the commencement of the programme. Slow learners are identified with the policy of students less than 60 % in internal exams and Advanced learners are identified as the students scoring 60 % and above. Students enrolled in various disciplines are identified as slow and advanced learners based on internal marks. This helps to identify the slow learners and thus helps to design special coaching so as to bridge the gap between the slow learners and the advanced learners.

Slow learners are identified on the basis of their performance in CIA Examinations. Different strategies like :

remedial coaching, peer-teaching, mentor motivation, homework, weekly tests, etc. are employed for the progress of the slow learners, of which remedial coaching is of a great help. Special programmes for the slow learners are conducted outside the regular teaching hours. Mentor counsels allotted via mentor and mentee and thus motivate them to cope up with academic programme.

The departments evolve their own strategies including supply of simplified study materials and question banks for effective learning. It mainly focuses upon reducing their failure in the courses and developing confidence in them to pursue their studies. Consequently, the dropout rate due to arrears is considerably reduced.

Advance Learners: Additional teaching methodologies adopted to the advance learners who are encouraged to register for SWAYAM, NPTEL, online courses. Group discussion, problem solving, and preparation of models etc and also motivating the students to take up on-line courses.

On the other hand, there are advanced learners who could achieve great heights with proper coaching. For them, enrichment programmes of various facts have been organized. The enrichment programmes for the students include the following features:

- Organization of Quiz competitions and Group Discussions ;
- Participate in debates on current issues, assignments on recent topics;
- Encourage to write competitive exams ;
- Motivate to attend various competitions;
- Guidance and counseling for higher education and research ;
- Involve them in project work and research work ;
- Encourage to attend university/national/ international conferences /workshop/seminars as participants or present papers; and
- Motivate to undertake online certificate courses in **MOOC, NPTEL and SWAYAM**.

The College campus is Wi-Fi enabled campus. All teachers use ICT facilities for teaching, learning and evaluation. The faculty were trained in the development of e-content and that enhanced the use of ICT for teaching-learning and evaluation. Teaching and learning through ICT facilitates innovative interaction between the teachers and the students. Concepts are made intelligible with e-demonstrations and other ICT tools thereby amplifying the interest of the students to fare better and retain the information for a longer period of time.

Individual Departments have created class wise Whatsapp group to upload and view contents like articles, and discussions on different themes and the students are also encouraged to post their comments.

The COVID-19 situation paved the way for virtual mode of teaching-learning and evaluation.

The College has an exclusive Zoom tool to conduct special meetings and webinars. G- Suite is exclusively purchased to conduct online classes.

Online tests are conducted through Google Forms, and the score sheets are made ready as soon as the exams are over. The students are given orientation to submit the assignments through the Google Classroom tool. The faculty members are also posting the subject notes on the Google Classroom.

Open educational resources like NPTEL, make classroom teaching more effective.

academic and non-academic activities.

The departments prepare a semester plan/ for the semester based on the academic calendar which includes workshops, conferences, guest lectures, seminars, industrial visits, extension activities, value added courses etc.

Timetables are prepared well in advance and are displayed on the notice board of each class room and ERP.

Each semester, the faculty prepares a course plan which includes the details about the number of teaching hours for each unit, course outcomes, delivering methods and reference, textbooks, etc. Lesson plans are verified by the heads of the departments and approved by the principal. Periodically, the head of the departments and principal verify the course delivery of the lesson plan and the progress of the units covered. Teachers are highly committed in implementing the unit planner to accomplish their teaching mission.

The HOD of each department ensures the effectiveness of the progress by checking weekly the teachers log book, attendance, academic records and syllabus completion statements that are submitted by the faculty. The effectiveness is further ensured through cross verification by the Head of the Institution once in a month.

2.5.3 IT integration and reforms in the examination procedures and processes including Continuous Internal Assessment (CIA) have brought in considerable improvement in Examination Management System (EMS) of the Institution

Response:

The college has taken extensive efforts to reform the examination processes and procedures that have brought in considerable improvement in examination management system of the institution. An Examination Management System automates the entire exam process to save time and provide accuracy. A few exams from thousands of students each semester is daunting at the best of times, hinges on an overwhelming experience for faculty, from pre-prep to exam setup and then marking and distribution. Actually, EMS is a software that has been developed to manage the entire exam process. It covers all the

activities that are related to examination management, right from receiving enrollment and examination forms, to the processing of exams, printing, distribution and statistical reports.

The reforms aim to increase objectivity, decrease subjectivity, has taken the process to facilitate good and timely decisions, take time and stress off faculty, declaration of results, and settle the exam grievances in the shortest possible time. EMS is not only providing the benefits to the exam process but also management concepts like authentic and reliable examinations, accurate error free examinations, become paper free, save time, cost and resources and deliver the exam results with a click. So, the Office of the Controller of Examinations of the college was automated with highly reliable software like COXCO (2017 to 2018) and AVEON (2019 onwards) to expedite the examination processes.

Following are the procedures which have been automated:

Creation of Students' Database

The details of the admitted students are entered in the software, and the details such as Students' names, Examination register number, Students' Bio-data, Year of study, Semester, and Details of subjects can be generated.

Registration for Examination

To generate an examination portal the following details are added in the portal (i) Course Detail, (ii) Course Credit, (iii) Mark Definition, (iv) Fee Configuration, (v) Regulation of Subject and (vi) Nominal Roll Generation.

Examination Schedule

The End Semester Examination schedule is prepared and fit in the CMS portal for the generation of examination hall plan, seating arrangement, display, foil card, attendance and so on. The examination schedule is communicating to the students through the college website.

Issue of Hall Tickets

The office of the Controller of Examinations can download the hall tickets of eligible candidates from the CMS portal.

Staff Login ID

For every staff of the college an individual id was created in the CMS portal. Through which they can upload the CIA marks, Question Bank and Attendance of the students is posted.

End Semester Examinations Question Paper

The ESE question papers are extracted from the question bank by the Office of the Controller of Examinations which is uploaded in the CMS portal by the concerned course teacher.

Examination Marks Entry

The Internal and End-Semester Examinations marks are entered in the database and can be used later for results publication. The internal mark of the students is entered in the CMS portal by the concerned course teacher through their log in id and the external mark are entered in the CMS portal by the Office of the Controller of Examinations.

Results Analysis

Course Wise Result Analysis, Programme Wise Result Analysis and Consolidated Result Analysis are generated and analysed by the Controller of Examinations.

Results Publication

The results are generated and published in the college website. The students can view and download their results using their Register Number as User name and Date of Birth as Password.

Preparation of Marks Statements

The semester mark statements and consolidated mark statements are generated for eligible graduates. The list of eligible graduates sent to Madurai Kamaraj University for the issue of Provisional and Degree certificates.

The institution has enrolled in National Academic Depository (NAD), under which the students and other stakeholders can have access to academic records through NAD Portal.

2.6 Student Performance and Learning Outcomes

2.6.1 Programme and course outcomes for all Programmes offered by the institution are stated and displayed on website and communicated to teachers and students.

Response:

- **Outcome-Based-Education (OBE) has been implemented since 2020** in our college. The faculty members have been provided with an orientation to the OBE process through a series of workshops organized by the IQAC.
- Programme outcomes (POs), Programme Specific Outcomes (PSOs), and Course Outcomes (COs) have been framed based on the vision and mission of the College and Graduate Attributes (GAs)
- Curriculum development cell (CDC) directs the departments through Deans' to prepare the Programme Outcomes, Programme Specific Outcomes and Course Outcomes by the Heads of the

Department as a prelude for designing the syllabi.

- In the Board of Studies (BoS) meeting the outcomes and the syllabi are finalized after a detailed discussion and agreement.
- The BoS minutes are again forwarded to the Academic Council for formal approval and then implemented by the departments concerned.
- The curricula are accepted along with external experts concerning with different disciplines.
- The outcomes and the syllabi are uploaded in the college website.
- The POs are also conveyed to the students by the class in charge. At the beginning of the semester, the teaching-learning and assessment methods are planned and the session plan is included in the syllabus.
- The mapping of the POs with the COs is incorporated in the syllabus along with the unit-wise division of the syllabus, the hours allotted and the text and reference books.
- In the first class, every course teacher communicates elaborately on the COs that must be revealed by the students on course completion.

2.6.2 Attainment of programme outcomes and course outcomes are evaluated by the institution.

Response:

Course Outcomes (COs), Programme Specific Outcomes (PSOs) attainment is evaluated by internal and external methods. Course Teachers, Head of Departments, faculty members of the board of studies carry out internal evaluations.

The PSOs and COs are evaluated by the external members of the Board of Studies, Academic Council, and College Committee, who also offer suggestions for improvement.

The CO of each course of UG and PG programmes is correlated with knowledge levels K1 to K5 of Revised Bloom's Taxonomy and assessment of students at various knowledge levels is directly linked with the COs.

A correlation is established between COs and PSOs on a scale of 1 to 3, 1 being slight (low), 2 being moderate (medium) and 3 being substantial (high).

For every course in the program including the elective subjects a mapping matrix is prepared. The COs are written and their mappings with PSOs are reviewed by a committee of senior faculty members before they are finalized.

The effectiveness of students in CIA and ESE is used to evaluate the attainment of COs. Two internal tests, an Assignment, a seminar, and a quiz at various knowledge levels are all administered as part of the direct style of assessment to cover the COs.

To assess a performer's degree of attainment, rubrics are used during the evaluation process. The pass percentage required for each CO in a subject is the threshold value. Following are the criteria that were used below for internal exams:

Attainment level 1 (low): 50% of the students secure more than 47% of its threshold value which is considered as a low level.

Attainment level 2 (medium): 60% of the students secure more than 47% of its threshold value which is considered as a medium level.

Attainment level 3 (high): 70% of the students secure more than 47% of its threshold value which is considered as a high level.

Threshold value for External exams:

Attainment level 1 (low): 50% of the students secure more than 35% of its threshold value which is considered as a low level.

Attainment level 2 (medium): 60% of the students secure more than 35% of its threshold value which is considered as a medium level.

Attainment level 3 (high): 70% of the students secure more than 35% of its threshold value which is considered as a high level.

Attainment of Programme Specific Outcome (PSO)

PSO is achieved and demonstrated through the integration of course components and CO. PSOs are framed based on Graduate Attributes (GA). COs are linked to PSOs using the CO to PSO matrix specified in the course syllabus. For each course, COs are mapped to appropriate PSOs to ensure all PSOs are filled. PSO attainment is calculated using a predefined CO/PSO matrix and the final CO attainment value of the course.

Response:

The institute provides all necessary infrastructural facilities and a conducive environment to promote research activity in the campus. Faculty are encouraged to apply for various funding agencies and pursue their research. However, the institute is ready to provide seed funding or partial funding based on the merit of proposals submitted by faculty or student. The faculty and students are encouraged to present their ideas / project proposals before the Reach and Development Cell of G.T.N. Arts College for getting the sanction of seed funding in accordance with institute guidelines.

The faculty and students are given freedom to choose the research area of their choice and guidance is given to seek funding from various funding agencies and industries. The institute encourages the faculty by providing incentives for peer reviewed publications, writing books and filing patents. The institute takes care of patent filing process, which is governed by the Research policy of the institute.

The institute gives a free hand to report research results and findings. However, a thorough review is done for all research proposals seeking funding from various funding agencies by consulting the research committee comprising the Director R& D, Head of respective department and subject expert(s) of the department. This committee also monitors the impact of research and consultancy and ensures non-violation of research & consultancy ethics, professional ethics, privacy of the people, human rights, causing problems to health & safety of human beings and damage of the property.

Five Research Centres are established in various departments of the institute with basic necessary instruments, software and computing facilities for carrying out society-oriented and solution oriented research activities. The Research Centres are recognized by Madurai Kamaraj University and fulltime research scholars are allotted by the University to pursue their research work in these centres under the guidance of the 26research guides.

It is mandatory for all the students to actively take part in various activities of the outreach programmes and these programmes help the students to learn to respect others and be sensitive to the needs of the others understand the social realities of rural areas appreciate the rural masses and their issues .

Five villages namely Seelapadi, Chettinayakanpatti, Tottanuthu, Adiyannuthu and Kurumbapatti are adopted by our college through Swachh Bharat and Unnat Bharat Abiyan schemes of Ministry of Education.

NSS, NCC, YRC and RRC units have actively participated in numerous programs such as Jal Shakthi Abhiyan, rainwater harvesting, drug abuse awareness, road safety and helmet awareness, COVID-19 vaccination camp, National Unity Day, Flag Day, First Aid training programme. Independence Day, Orientation Programme on Swachh Bharat Event, Swachh Bharath Seva, NSS day celebration, Dengue Awareness, Voters Day and Republic Day were organized and celebrated and Association with Dindigul Police, Dindigul Corporation, Southern Indian Railways, Lions and Rotary Club of Dindigul.

The Mega blood donation camp was organized in association with Government Hospital, Dindigul and Blood Banks from nearby districts (Karur, Madurai, Theni, Pudukottai) in which 1000 units of blood was donated by our college students. This achievement was recorded in “Orange World Record”.

During Dengu and Covid-19 pandemic, students prepared Nilavembu kudineer and Kabasura kudineer, which they distributed in the adopted and nearby villages.

About 2000 Palm seeds were sowed around the Vadamdurai lake area by our college NSS and NCC students. Also, our students have actively participated in temple cleaning activities in Thadicombu Soundaraja Temple, Vadamadurai Siva Temple, Kottai Mariamman Temple, etc.,

Criterion 4 - Infrastructure and Learning Resources

4.1 Physical Facilities

4.1.1 The Institution has adequate infrastructure and physical facilities for teaching- learning. viz., classrooms, laboratories, computing equipment etc.

Response:

The Institution ensures that it constantly updates the physical infrastructure. It has an established system to monitor the utilization of available supporting physical facilities. Significant budgetary allocations for infrastructural support, maintenance and expansion have been earmarked annually by the institution. The college has a separate wing for the Office of Controller of Examinations, Administrative Office, IQAC office, Stationary Store and Department of Physical Education.

Classrooms & Other Physical Facilities: Every department has required number of spacious classrooms with high ceilings. The college has **excellent infrastructure** to conduct regular classes with six blocks with 74 spacious and ventilated classrooms with all the requisite facilities, in which 46 classrooms equipped with ICT facilities enable the members of the faculty to support their teaching sessions with audios, videos, graphs, images and PowerPoint presentations. The college has 2 Seminar Halls, Administrative Block, Principal's office, Visitors' room, Auditorium, Faculty rooms, Media Centre, IQAC office, office of the Controller of Examinations, Placement cell, Counselling room, NSS room, NCC room, Stationary Store, Innovation Centre, Health Care Centre, Physical Education department and separate hostels for Girls and Boys. The total campus is under 24/7 CCTV surveillance.

Laboratories: A well equipped, spacious UG and PG laboratories are attached to the science departments. Instruments necessary to carry out laboratory experiments are adequate.. Computers, Wifi connectivity, seven computer laboratories with 213 computers with necessary peripherals, 100 computers in computer centre and 500mbps bandwidth connectivity are also available. This ensures smooth functioning of digitized working environment. An IT team looks after the maintenance and service of the computers in the entire zone. A language lab functions to facilitate language learning and communication among the Student community.

Library: The College has a library located in the heart of the campus. It could accommodate more than 450 Students at a time .Student community, Faculty members, and Research Scholars have easy access to **45115 books**. Besides, plenty of e sources and internet connections are available. The College library provides E-resources like **DELNET, N-LIST and INFLIBNET** for the benefit of the student. Besides, it subscribes to popular journals, magazines and news papers. **TURNITIN** Software is also available for checking Plagiarism. Free Wi-Fi access is provided to the students and staff.

Seminar Hall and Auditorium: Dr. A. P. J. Abdul Kalam auditorium which is available with a seating capacity of 3000 is a big boon to our college. It is fully air conditioned, well equipped with audio-visual facilities. It is used for conducting National, International Conferences, Seminars, Symposium, Guest Lectures, Ph.D. Viva-Voce, Department Events, Inter/Intra collegiate competitions, Graduation Day and Fresher's Day.

Sports and Games: The College has a spacious ground. It is used for athletic events both track and field and for games like Kabbadi, Cricket, Basketball, Football, Volleyball, Throw ball, and Ball Badminton.

The indoor games like Table tennis, Badminton, Carrom, and Chess are also carried out in the Auditorium.

Other Centres: The institution has **IGNOU** Study Centre. A well furnished Placement Cell is also functioning.

It is headed by the Director of Physical Education and assisted by Assistant Director, and the Physical Education Department staff. Besides, a number of coaches are engaged for individual game. The department is equipped with the following sport fields for Indoor and Outdoor games: Indoor Sports / games: Table Tennis, Weightlifting, Hand ball, Taekwondo, Judo, Carrom, Chess, Outdoor Sports / games: Foot ball, Ball badminton, Basket Ball, Volley Ball, Hand Ball Cricket Nets Kabaddi (Men), Kho – Kho, Badminton. The Gym is furnished with necessary equipments. Yoga Centre trains our students in yoga and meditation.

Sports and Games

The Institution provides enough facilities for sports, games both for indoor and outdoor. The institution has conducted numerous activities for both students and staff members. The institution is providing **scholarship for sports students every year with free education, accommodation and food**. TA & DA is given to attend the sports events for both Students and Staff.

Every year **International Yoga day** is celebrated in a grand and unique way in order to popularize Yoga, meditation and our rich culture.

Fine Arts Club and Cultural Activities

The Fine Arts Club is very vibrant. It provides a positive platform for the students to explore their potential and to show case their talents. Cultural events are periodically organized to bring out and fine tune students artistic talents. Students are encouraged to participate in Elocution Contests, Drawing Competitions, Essay Competitions, Mime, Dance, Folklore and Martial Art (Silambam). They often participating intercollegiate and intra-collegiate bodies across the state.

Intra Department, Inter Department and Inter Collegiate annual day and cultural events are also celebrated. The Auditorium is fully air conditioned, well equipped with Audio-Visual facilities, Electronic facilities and sound system. A separate hall with versatile facilities is allotted for the students to practice their cultural events

4.2 Library as a Learning Resource**4.2.1 Library is automated using Integrated Library Management System (ILMS)****Response:**

The College Library provides open access to all students, faculty members and researchers during the library hours. OPAC (Online Public Access Catalogue) helps students and staff view the availability of books and other library resources. The software ERP has been updated with a newer version during the academic year 2019-2020. E-Gate entry facility is introduced for monitoring library user attendance during the year 2020 – 2021. Details of the issue of books to students, staff, and research scholars are recorded. A weekly, monthly and annual report can be generated, based on the information requested by the user, for book purchase, stock verification, usage report of students, staff and scholars from the ILMS. The library is updated regularly to create current awareness and Newspaper clippings are displayed on the notice board. The Library provides the facilities of a partially automated library system for the student's enrichment of knowledge. The students get benefitted through the access of these automated facilities to gain more information and knowledge.

E-Library & E-resources

The College library provides E-resources like **DELNET, N-LIST, and INFLIBNET** for the benefit of the students. Free Wi-Fi access is available in the library. The library has 45115 books, 9 journals and 31 magazines along with 9 newspapers both in Tamil and English. The books are bar-coded and laser scanners

are used in the circulation counter for book transactions. Apart from being a repository of several books, journals, magazines and other supplementary resources, the library preserves the Dissertations, Theses, Projects, Audio-Visual Materials and a book collection on Competitive Exams. The college has registered a digital library called **NDLI**. The digital library shall be accessed through desktop as well as Mobile inside the library block. **TURNITIN** software is available for checking plagiarism. Library has partially automated with KOHA software.

Department Libraries

Department libraries are also available in the following Departments: Mathematics, Physics, Chemistry, Zoology, English, Commerce, History, Computer Science, Business Administration, Social work and Information Technology to enhance the reading skills of the students. In the Tamil department, a collection of rare books are available.

Catalogue

In the Library, each book is assigned an accession number with a barcode. The **catalogue of books consists of title, author and publication**. The details of membership are entered for both staff and students with their college ID number. Important news clippings are archived for future reference. The Library plays an important role in supporting the teaching, learning and research activities. Students and Staff are provided with a separate space to read newspapers and magazines.

backup facilities using UPS and Generator. The systems are user-friendly and helpful to the students in academics. The students and faculty members are finding it very much helpful in guiding and working with subject oriented tasks given. The speed of the internet inside the campus is 500 Mbps. The college has provided LCD projectors, smart boards, printers with scanning and copying facilities to each department for effective ICT enabled teaching-learning. Online VIVA – VOCE examinations for Ph.D. scholars and Webinars conducted through ZOOM. Engineering Counseling for Directorate of Technical Education (DOTE), Chennai, Registration, Training for Treasury officials and Police Personnel are being conducted. Online TET Exams, NPTEL Exams, TNPSC group exams and Various Online Government exams are conducted in this Institution by the computer facilities available in this Campus. All computers in the lab are maintained by 4 System Engineers appointed in the institution.

Wi-Fi Facility

The campus has free Wi-Fi Facility. The internet service is provided by BSNL and JIO using separate leased line with 500 MBPS speed. All the laboratories of the different departments have Internet facility connected through intelligent switches. All the access points are password protected. All the faculty members and students in the institution are benefitted by this access of free Wi-Fi. This helps in the updating of information in academic- oriented works and activities. The modern scenario of digital world is always connected and enriches by helpful resources of free facilities provided. There is a 24/7 CCTV surveillance security available in the institution. The students on the premises are watched in their interest to maintain discipline. Computer network using both LAN and WAN through Fibre Optic Cable (FOC). The NETFOX FIREWALL security software is used to monitor unwanted users. Also K7 and Vibranium Antivirus software's are used to control the virus.

The classrooms are properly utilized to accommodate students of all programmes. The college has both Aided and Self-Supporting Streams. Computer Labs

Nearly 313 computers, are available in 07 laboratories. CMS–ERP software is maintained for teaching and learning process.

Science Labs

Separate labs for Science departments are functioning with necessary modern equipments and it is well maintained by AMC.

Sports

The court yard of the play fields is being cleaned and maintained, and the boundaries are marked before the academic year starts. The Physical Education Department maintains the stock register for all the sports equipments.

Classrooms

Spacious ICT class rooms are furnished with LED lights and fans and RO drinking water is provided near all the classrooms.

Maintenance and Utilization Policies

The Institution follows a systematic and transparent procedure in purchase, maintenance and utilization of equipments for subject Laboratories, Computer labs, Physical Education Department, Library Books and other support facilities.

The Governing Body is the apex body to enforce the policies and strategies. The Chairman and Secretary is the chairperson of the Governing body of the College. The Chairman and Secretary is the deciding authority to enforce all policies, recruitments, service guidelines, and infrastructure amplification. The Governing Body reviews the overall functions, proposes new academic initiatives, explores networking, and suggests various campus developmental activities in the college. Teaching Staff:

The college administration pays for the travel expenses for teachers who present research papers at international and intra-national conferences, seminars, and workshops. The college also encourages faculty

to take up examinerships with different institutions and to attend the BOS meeting of invited institutions. This helps the staff to understand the positive aspects of the syllabi of host and guest institutions. In addition, the college has implemented group insurance for teachers, granting 50% concession on their fees. Both teaching and non-teaching staff are covered under EPF and ESF facilities. All eligible leaves are granted as per government norms and maternity leave is permitted for a maximum period of one year. Pongal bonus is given as per government norms, as well as providing medical leave and earn leave and group insurance for the non-teaching staff. Similar to the teaching staff, the ward of non-teaching staff is provided with 50 percent concession in the education fee. Free uniforms are given to the drivers and also to security staff of our college.

6.4.3 Institutional strategies for mobilisation of funds and the optimal utilisation of resources

Response:

The College has two streams of students, viz., one in the Aided Stream and Self-Financed Stream. Grant-in-Aid is received from State Government towards salary for the aided Teaching and Non- Teaching Staff. Salary for self-financed Faculty is paid from the Management Account. The fund for management is mobilized from the Self Finance Course students. As per the regulations of the Government of Tamil Nadu and the Parent University (that is Madurai Kamaraj University, Madurai), the College mobilizes funds from students through tuition fee, admission fee, exam fee, lab fee, Certificate Course fee, Caution Deposits and other fees and the fund is maintained in various accounts. Autonomous Grant is received from the UGC. For the upgradation of Science Departments, College sanctioned funds from DBT Star College Scheme. Research Grants for Minor and Major Research Projects are obtained from DST, TNSCST and ICSSR. From the UGC, every year, the College receives Autonomy Grant on settling the previous year's accounts and allocates the fund to the College. The College also receives BC, MBC and SC/ST scholarship from the State Government. The Alumni of the College, Faculty Members, Parents and well-wishers extend financial assistance to the College in the form of Endowments every year. The scholarships for meritorious and minority students are given by the Trust.

Utilization - The funds are used for the purpose for which they are granted and mobilized. The surplus, if any, are reserved by the Institution for providing high quality academic amenities, state-of-the-art infrastructure and welfare measures. The College utilizes funds every year for:

- Maintaining and augmenting infrastructure and equipment;
- Conducting Seminars, Workshops, Lectures and Inter-collegiate events.
- Funds are also provided the faculty members attending Seminars/Conferences/Workshops and Providing Seed money to Faculty members so as to promote research;
- The College has an ethical policy not to receive any kinds of donation for admission of students and appointment of staff. Hence, the College has to rely solely on Government Funds followed by the funds raised from generosity of its well-wishers and the Management used for all round developmental activities.

The initiatives of IQAC oriented the CoE Office to adopt online automation. This helped the students to pay their examination fees, Downloading Halltickets, Online Result publications and so on.

- About 9 new programmes were introduced during the assessment period by persuading the management for the betterment of the student community.
- Through Skill Development Centre, a Typewriting Centre was started in the Academic Year 2018-2019 and about 2 students got proficient in their typing skills which help them to handle the computer easily in their day-to-day life.
- Alumni Association was strengthened and about 38,00,000 lakhs Rupees was generated for various activities in campus.
- DBT STAR COLLEGE SCHEME was introduced in the academic year 2021-2022. The departments of Zoology, Physics, Chemistry and Mathematics were awarded to carry out the scheme. About Rs.82,00,000 was sanctioned by the Department of Biotechnology, Ministry of Education, New Delhi.
- The initiatives of IQAC led to the adoption of the Unnat Bharat Abhiyan Scheme of the Ministry of Education and about Rupees Fifty Thousand only received to carry out developmental changes in the selected villages.
- IQAC convinced the management to harness solar energy to maintain the green campus. This led to the installation of a 25KV Solar power plant in the New Admin Block and the entire block is energized by solar power.
- IQAC conducted a NAAC-sponsored one-day National Workshop titled “Outcome Based Education – A Paradigm Shift” on 27.06.2019.
- The college is participating in NIRF from the academic year 2019-2020 and submitting the data as per the guidelines.
- The Ministry of Educations Institution Innovation Council [IIC] is functioning from the academic year 2021-2022. The performance of the institution is accredited with 4-star Rating.

The teaching-learning pedagogy and the feedback mechanism are constantly Institutionalized to attain excellence. The suggestions and recommendations are given by the External Experts in the External Academic Audit are carefully taken for the progressive development of the institution.

The Mentor-Mentee System is being followed in all departments to closely monitor the overall performance of the learners. Mentor-Mentee register is created and learners' performances are carefully documented. Both moral and academic related advice is given to tune the learners and prepare them as socially responsible citizens.

Outcome Based Education (OBE) Syllabus was introduced in the Academic Year 2017-18. Periodical meetings among the HoDs and Faculty members are arranged to appraise them about Pos, PSOs and Cos. Workshops are also arranged for constructing Articulation Mapping by inviting eminent resource persons from other institutions.

Stakeholders Review on Teaching Learning process

The IQAC collects online feedback in the even semester of every academic year. Feedback is collected from Students, Teachers, Alumni and Employers. The analyzed reports are appraised to the principal and the management for further action and to improve the learning process.

Each department establishes an Internal quality in charge to collect and deliver the inter department data's to IQAC institution head , All the head of the departments, and a Board of Studies (BoS) to monitor the teaching-learning process and its requirements in terms of curriculum development, new courses, the creation of new facilities, and the training programmes required, among other things.

Every semester, academic assessment is held to measure and compare learning outcome attainment levels to specified targets. In this meeting, necessary actions to increase such attainment levels are addressed and presented to the board of studies. Academic Audit Academic auditing is being planned to monitor and review the performance of all programmes at the school. The Academic Audit team assesses the procedures involved in curriculum design and development activities, teaching-learning processes, student learning assessment processes, resource quality to satisfy learning outcomes, curricular and extra-curricular activities. Furthermore, the academic audit team evaluates faculty competencies, as well as the quality and quantity of research and consultancy outcomes.

A Self Assessment Report (a specific format developed by the institution) is prepared for each programme to quantify the efforts of the faculty and students and is submitted electronically. It is envisioned to elaborate on curriculum, teaching learning, research, infrastructure and learning resources, student support and progression, and student performance. Every year, all of the institution's programmes are subjected to an academic audit. For each program/department, the Principal In charge appoints an audit team of two external academicians with accreditation expertise and professionalism. The audit team does offline / online evaluations by reviewing documents and interacting with stakeholders. An audit report with

commendations and recommendations for improving the system is distributed.

Eminent advocates particularly women advocate gave awareness about the penal provisions against the ragging, eve teasing and harassment through various programmes.

Besides the above, a safe space and healthy environment created to the students, through establishment of YRC, RRC and NSS. They have conducted various programmes to sensitise the stakeholders about the gender consciousness, health and hygiene. The college is spread over 37.01 acres in a rural setting in green picturesque terrain. Indeed, it is a great task to keep the region untainted. Cleanliness is not just about picking waste from one place and dumping

in another place. It is significant how waste segregation should be based on its type and it needs the most appropriate treatment and disposal. To create an immaculate environment the college regularly conducted many awareness sessions for the stakeholders on the issues and sustainable strategies for waste management.

Solid Waste Management

Dustbins are kept in various places and they are easily accessible for students and staff in all buildings. Dustbins are in various colours and labelled as bio-degradable and non-biodegradable. Food waste obtained from hostels, canteen like scraps of vegetables, fruits and green wastes such as flowers, and dry leaves is carefully disposed of in composite pits with all necessary steps to achieve favourable green manure in the form of vermicomposting. The manure is really helpful to maintain the fanned-out college garden in a robust condition in every way. The extraction of bio-gas is also processed and it is highly useful for cooking in the college hostel. Paper wastes are aggregated in the designated place and it is carried off properly by the concerned vendors to ensure proper waste management. This process helps to extract maximum benefits and to generate a minimum amount of end waste.

Liquid Waste Management

Considering liquid waste management, perpetually people are working to inspect leaks in pipes, taps and valves around the campus. Water from the mess, canteen, wash basins and chemical laboratories pass through concealed pipes into the soak pit. Further, the wastewater is also recycled, and used for irrigation as well as for non-potable use.

E-Waste Management

The college premises included a plethora of computer laboratories and thus e-wastes are inevitable. Defected computers or their electronic parts are not dumped for long time but it is carried off by the authorized dealers to reuse the useful parts and also these pieces are kept for study purpose in the labs to teach about interior components practically.

Hazardous Chemical Waste Management

In chemistry laboratory, there are number of chemical samples, cleaning agents are stored. It needs high scrutinization for disposal. For the same lab, pack disposal system is followed. This process involves identifying, segregating each chemical according to its types and deposit in a drum in their respective areas. Moreover, it is essential to ensure that these chemicals are shifted in a safe way without causing any chemical reaction. Lab-in charges and the teachers follow an unequivocal principle to neutralize the chemicals before discharge.

Bio-Medical Waste Management

In zoology laboratory, microbiological and immunological wastages are properly disposed and handled more safely.

The college has high concern over pollution, plastic, litter free campus and handle with great care by adopting the three Rs such as Reduce, Recycle and Reuse.

Best Practice I

Title of the Practice

Enriching Lives through Innovation and Entrepreneurship

Objectives of the Practice

With a belief that innovation and entrepreneurship can be a key to fair and inclusive future, the college established Institution's Innovation Council (IIC) as per the guidance of the Ministry of Education (MoE), Government of India (GoI). The objectives of this practice are:

- To develop a vibrant local ecosystem to incubate and promote innovative ideas.
- To create entrepreneurship opportunities for students, faculty, and society.
- To foster the start-ups by providing them with the assistance they require.
- To organize periodic lectures/seminars, workshops, hands-on-training, internal hackathons, and mentoring sessions.
- To instil the spirit and passion of building own ambitious enterprises.
- To convert innovation into commercialization.

The Context

Since innovations and entrepreneurship are essentially two sides of the same coin, they may both be characterised by their relationship. Innovative phenomena require some form of entrepreneurial behaviour and practices. A successful entrepreneur understands the importance of bringing novel ideas into practise. In this context, IIC of the college aspires to offer a comprehensive ecosystem that equips the next generation of thinkers to be design leaders who benefit both industries in general and society. The cell encourages students to analyse and resolve a real-world entrepreneurship issue in stipulated time. It works to offer the students the information they need while encouraging them to launch their start-ups.

The IIC strives to provide its students with the resources they need to overcome market constraints, lack of mentorship, creative barriers, and economic challenges. By offering entrepreneurs top-notch sources and assistance, it aims to enrich lives of the students through innovation and entrepreneurship to make social transformation. Besides, this cell teaches the students about functions of entrepreneurship, which includes planning, starting, managing and running a business followed by risk taking, uncertainty bearing and innovative undertaking in the business.

The Practice

Starting an entrepreneurial venture is a difficult endeavour in today's changing business environment scenario. It is also critical to identify the challenges in them. Considering this, IIC of the college conducts various activities to promote most engaging environment of innovation and entrepreneurship amongst its students and faculties by inviting experts and trainers from different business ventures.

The IIC is primarily concerned with developing a vibrant local innovation eco-system, establishing a start-up support mechanism in the institute and preparing the Institute for Atal Ranking of Institutions on Innovation Achievements (ARIIA) Framework. The institution strives to create a functional eco-system for scouting ideas and pre-incubation of ideas and develop better cognitive abilities for the students.

The cell regularly conducts various innovations and entrepreneurship related activities as prescribed by the Central MoE's Innovation Cell (MIC) in time bound fashion. It organises periodic workshops, seminars, lectures, and interactive sessions to create a mentor pool for student innovators.

The cell also organizes internal hackathons, where a call for invitation for innovative ideas and projects, which shortlisted based on the societal relevance and judged by jury members for evaluation. The ideas must be social relevant to the current business scenario, and this helps to solve social issues. The college provides all the resources and support to the students to complete the project successfully and the IIC acts as a bridge between the industry and the academia.

The following facilities are provided to convert ideas into products:

- Providing the budding innovators with a range of services, that provides information on all aspects of enterprise and innovative business venture building.
- Inviting well trained experts from industries of different kinds and related disciplines to inspire students to pursue entrepreneurship.
- Suggesting and guiding the students in choosing their projects.
- Scheduling frequent visits to the industry to become acquainted with people who are already succeeding as entrepreneurs in the business ventures.
- Conducting internal hackathons to promote skill development and boosting the innovative culture; and
- Identifying blooming entrepreneurs to share their success stories.

Since IIC is a component of the MoE, GoI, the students from the college took part in hackathons at the national level and connect with notable academicians and businesspeople to develop their entrepreneurial talents. This makes the students more aware of the potential advantages of being a prospective entrepreneur and provides them with possibilities to adopt and equip an innovative culture.

Evidence of Success

The IIC 3.0 was established in the college on October 2021 and since its inception, it organised 78 fruitful activities in fulfilling the objectives of IIC in all the 4 quarters. These activities gave exposures and ample opportunities for students and staffs. The participants understood the importance of innovation, inculcating the culture of entrepreneurship skill and thus considering start-up as an alternative career option.

The college secured with 4 Star Rating out of 5 with the score of 82.32 out of 100 and reward points of 81.02 in the final assessment by MoE's Innovation Cell (MIC) for the academic year 2020-2021.

A team of students namely *Centroid* and *Verizone* shortlisted to participate in the grand finale of the Smart India Hackathon 2022, the biggest national innovation contest for software edition. The team members of *Centroid* presented the idea of a *Smart Blood Bank Repository* held at the Maharashtra Institute of Technology, Aurangabad, Maharashtra and the members of *Verizone* presented the idea of *Voice Delivery of Academic Records* in the Talla Padmavathi College of Engineering, Warangal, Telangana.

A girl student from II M. Com established her start-up venture *Aishwaryam Masala*. Besides, six members of IIC completed Innovation Ambassador Training.

Problems Encountered and Resources Required

- Students could not be able to build commercial product due to financial constraints.
- Students must be supported by venture capital scheme.
- Students need of mentorship to build the innovative business model.
- Lack of experts in training innovative business venture.
- Need of Entrepreneur Hub / Incubator / Centre for Innovation or a similar facility on campus designed to support student entrepreneurship activities.

Best Practice II

This created a sense of pride in achievements in different sports activities. The main mission of the college is to bring out students the innate talents and hidden potentials in sports. The objectives of this practice are:

- To foster self-confidence, collaboration, leadership, and perseverance while preparing them to confront challenges in life.

The Context
